Caring for the sibling bond : a contemporary challenge of contextual therapy



Summary:

Over the last few decades, the family has evolved in many ways. Among other

things, the issues surrounding the conjugal bond are constantly changing. In this configuration, the sibling bond appears in a new light. Indeed, if the sibling bond has always been the longest of our existence, today it sometimes appears as the most stable, acting as a link between households in the case of marital separation and/or family recomposition.

Yet it's striking how little attention is paid in child-adolescent-adult-couples and even family therapies to the sibling bond, although it determines a whole series of relational experiences in childhood and adulthood. The durability and impact of the sibling bond on our lives, choices and relationships (couple, friendship, professional relationships, parenthood) should lead us to take it more into account, in order to take care of it, for today and the future.

Boszormenyi-Nagy's contextual approach is an appropriate and useful tool for sibling therapy, identifying wounds, breaches of trust and experiences of injustice, but also respective contributions that are more or less recognized, and proposing a dialogue in which each person's needs are heard. Whether this dialogue takes place in childhood or adulthood, it always aims to reduce current suffering, while taking into account the potential impact on future generations. Based on clinical studies as well as clinical illustrations, we will show how the establishment of direct dialogue between siblings can be beneficial both for the dialogue partners and for their loved ones.
